The Swastika 30th July 2021

Did you know, that the swastika symbol originates in Eurasia as a religious icon, a symbol of divinity


and spirituality in Indian religions, including Buddhism, Jainism and Hinduism. It is found in the archaeological remains of the Indus Valley Civilisation and Samarra, as well as in early Byzantine and Christian artwork.

In Hindu and Buddhist cultures, the swastika is a holy symbol. On the holiday of Diwali, Hindu households commonly use the



swastika in decorations. Many Indian auto-rickshaws feature the swastika to ward off ill-fortune. The above image is on the Goa Lawah Hindu temple entrance in Bali, Indonesia

The word swastika has been used in the Indian subcontinent since 500 BCE. The word was first




recorded by the ancient linguist Pāṇini in his work *Ashtadhyayi*. It is alternatively spelled in contemporary texts as *svastika*, and other spellings were occasionally used in the 19th and early 20th century, such as *suastika*. It was derived from the Sanskrit term (Devanagari स्वस्तिक), which transliterates to *svastika* under the commonly used IAST transliteration system, but is

pronounced closer to *swastika* when letters are used with their English values. The above image is a Hindu temple in Rajasthan, India.

One has to wonder how such a venerated symbol of peace, spirituality, morality and religious harmony can become so despised by western civilizations.
